

NRHEG football team again aims for district title

The NRHEG High School football team is again looking to challenge for a district championship.

The Panthers, 7-3 overall and 6-2 in district play last year, graduated some talented players but have others who look ready to step up and fill their shoes.

Dan Stork enters his 24th year as a coach — 15th as head football coach — and is assisted by 26-year coach John Schultz, 13-year coach Grant Berg, and Drew Paukert, entering his fourth season. Stork has compiled a winloss record of 78-57 during his tenure. The Panthers' best record over the past five years was last year. The Panthers will again compete in the South Central District Blue Division in Class AA.

Key players graduated include Jack Schultz, a three-year two-way starting lineman who will play college football at UW-Eau Claire, quarterback/free safety Sam Prigge (1191 yards, 12 touchdowns), and Chad Agrimson, who started every game at center and defensive end.

Several members of the squad participated in offseason activities, including Minnesota State-Mankato's 7-on-7 passing league. Alex Buckmeier attended several college camps.

"We started a new workout program that included a speed and agility workout along with weight training that we feel is really going to make a difference this year," said Stork.

Key players returning:

• Cole Staloch, senior, led the team in receiving last year with

290 yards and five touchdowns while starting every game at line-backer and finishing as the team's No. 3 tackler.

- Perry Peterson, senior, was the Panthers' leading rusher with 1049 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also started all 10 games at outside linebacker and was fourth on the team in tackles.
- Buckmeier, junior, has started on the offensive and defensive lines the last two years and was the Panthers' leading tackler with 67 tackles and four sacks.
- Tyler Jacobson, junior, started at fullback and on defense last season.
- Brady Agrimson, junior, was a two-way starter at wide receiver and cornerback who finished with 200 receiving yards and three touchdowns.
- Jack Hogstad, junior, started every game at offensive tackle.
- Quintin Arndt, junior, started five games and offensive and defensive tackle.
- Jake Stork, junior, was a special teams standout and backup quarterback.
- Lucas Bailey, junior, has a lot of speed and looks to have a much bigger role this year at running back and linebacker.
- Cole Thompson, senior, started three games at cornerback and played some offense.

"We have some depth in our backfield and hope to use that depth to give opponents several different looks," he said.

The coach's biggest concern?


"Lack of depth in a number of positions," he said. "We need to stay healthy!"


Staying healthy, according to Stork, and having some young players step up their game is the key to success for the 2017 Panthers.

New look for NRHEG spikers

Many more return.

The list of returning juniors and seniors for coach Onika Peterson's Panthers is a long one, but the group who graduated accomplished much last season. They include Rachel Collins (466 assists, 33 kills, 33 digs, 10 ace serves), Grace Johns (273 digs, 5 assists, 1 kill, 19 ace serves), Maddie Wagner (178 kills, 160 digs, 18 ace blocks, 18 ace serves), Marnie Wagner (180 kills, 298 digs, 19 ace blocks, 6 ace serves), Gretchen Ramaker (109 kills, 82 digs, 14 ace blocks, 5 ace serves) and Natalie Aaseth (22 kills, 10 digs, 2 ace blocks).

"We graduated six girls who played huge roles for us last season," said Coach Peterson, whose team finished 10-13 overall and 2-6 in the Gopher Conference. Peterson, a fifth-year head vollevball coach, has a career record of 41-57-5 and is assisted by

Corrine and Schuller. The Panthers' best finish the last five years was in 2015, when they went 14-13 and finished as the sub-section runner-up.

Junior Olivia Christopherson is the lone player returning who started and played every match last season, totaling 105 kills, 154 digs, 8 ace blocks and 6 ace serves, but the list of other varsity candidates is a long one.

It includes seniors Betsy Schoenrock, Kelly Harden, Gabby Muri, Erin VanWilgen, Makenzi Rhoades, Michelle Katzung, Emily Crabtree and Lauren Herrmann, and juniors Alexis Anderson, Caitlin Goette, Darian Pearson, Laura Worrell, Hannah Budach, Kylie Arndt, Jayna Finseth, Sydney Schlinger and Lexie Ignaszewski.

For one thing, they'll be taller, led by the 6-3 Schoenrock who contributed heavily in basketball last year and figures to be a big factor on the volleyball court this

"That will allow us to be more aggressive offensively and defensively (blocking) than we have been in the past," said Peterson.

The coach's biggest concern is an obvious one: lack of varsity experience.

The key to success for the 2017 Panthers?

"Not to get frustrated and not to settle," said Peterson. "We are going to go through a learning curve, we are going to need some time before we are firing on all cylinders. If the girls stay positive and push each other, we will be successful."







CC teams return experienced runners

Lewer, Mely figure to lead Panthers in 2017

The overall numbers aren't spectacular, but hopes are up for the NRHEG cross country teams in 2017.

The boys graduated just one runner, Josh Fleming, and the girls figure to have a full squad for every meet, which was somewhat of a problem last year.

Fleming, of course, was the boys' MVP the past two years and a captain last season, and he'll be missed. But returning are four lettermen in seniors Ben Lewer and Kollin Reese, junior Jager Beck and freshman Daniel Nydegger.

"We have experienced letterwinners returning for the upcoming season," commented head coach Mike Weber, who's again assisted by Lori Tomsche, both in their ninth season. "Ben Lewer is a returning captain and a hopeful all-conference runner. He was one place away last season from earning conference recognition. Kollin Reese, Jager Beck, and Daniel Nydegger all contributed last year on varsity."

While Weber expects those runners to be consistent scorers for the Panthers, he said the overall success of the team will hinge upon some new, younger athletes in Agro Gushwa, Gavin Anderson and Tylar Malakowsky.

"All are possible athletes who could step up this season," said Weber.

Lewer will be the man to watch, but Weber feels Nydegger — who battled injury last year — could be a top runner for the Panthers despite being only a freshman.

Weber took a guess at the top conference teams this season with Mankato Loyola/Cleveland and Martin County West. The Panthers are looking to improve on an eighth-place finish last year.

In the section meet, where the NRHEG boys finished 20th, Weber favors Loyola/Cleveland and Gibbon-Fairfax-Winthrop.

The girls return 2016 MVP Jade Mely, a sophomore. Also back as letterwinners are junior Madisyn Bueltel, sophomore Mia Williams and sophomore Destiny Medrano. All earned NRHEG postseason awards last year.

"Jade Mely has been our MVP for the past couple seasons," said Weber. "Madisyn Bueltel and Mia Williams could once more push Jade this season as the top runner. Destiny Medrano has also been a solid runner for us the past

couple seasons."

What the Panthers are looking for is a fifth runner to complete the varsity.

That could be junior Brooke Wobschall, junior Rachel Horejsi or sophomore Journey Olson.


"Our main four will give us leadership and bring lots of experience at the varsity level," said Weber. "To be competitive, the girls will have to lower their times and bring along some new runners from the high school. A couple junior high runners might also influence the point production if they progress and land on our varsity squad. The team has potential to do well, but much depends

on additions to the squad this season."

Weber sees Martin County West and LCWM/Nicollet as teams to beat in the conference. Fairmont and Belle Plaine look to be strong on the section.




