

Track teams aiming for the upper half

Overall numbers down, but boys, girls return several letter winners for 2015

NEW RICHLAND — In the top half of the Gopher Conference.

That's where coach Duey Ferber would like to see the NRHEG boys' and girls' track and field teams by the end of the 2015 season.

The girls graduated just one senior, but she was a good one: two-time state high jump champion Carlie Wagner.

The girls finished fourth in the Gopher Conference and fifth in the sub-section last spring, the 24th for Ferber, who's again assisted by Chuck Crabtree, Jay Crabtree and Corrine Schuller.

Returning letter winners for the girls include senior Sandra Quezada, juniors Emily Eder, Katharine Lewer and Hailey Schuller, sophomores Gretchen Ramaker, Maddie Wagner and Marnie Wagner, and freshmen Katie Crabtree and Kelly Harden.

Ferber feels the Panthers'

strengths will lie in the hurdles, short and middle distances, high jump and long jump.

The biggest question mark is their lack of experience and depth.

"We are very young," said the coach. "We don't have a lot of depth."

Ferber picks WEM as the conference favorite and likes Maple River in the sub-section.

"We have an enthusiastic group of girls," said Ferber. "We are very young, but we will be trying to get better every day. We hope to finish in the top half of both the conference and the subsection."

The NRHEG boys graduated several key athletes, including MVP and state meet veteran T.J. Schiltz along with Raece Johnson, Adam Anderson, Nick Goette and Ross Chester.

Eleven lettermen return, seniors Kevin Kalis, Keith Maxon and Todd Erickson, juniors Ethan Borwege, John Cole, Zach Mely,

Softball Panthers look to replace Schultzes

Pitching, defense are keys for NRHEG nine

NEW RICHLAND - The 2015 NRHEG High School softball team has some big shoes to fill. Call it the Schultz factor.

The Panthers, 6-1 in the Gopher Conference and 14-8 overall last year, graduated six-year starter and all-state pitcher Jade Schultz. Her mom, head coach Wendy Schultz, followed suit and hung up her 17-year coaching career after the season.

But the 2015 Panthers are not completely without Schultzes and the cupboard is not completely bare. Jade has agreed to remain as the assistant for first-year head coach Coy Hupfeld, who's greeted by nine returning letter winners including two allconference players.

In addition to Jade Schultz, last year's Panthers graduated catcher and leadoff hitter Hannah Lundberg.

Returning award winners this year are senior Anna Stork (Golden Bat, all-conference) and sophomores Kayley Camerer (Golden Glove, all-conference) and Grace Johns (Most Improved). Stork batted .430 last year, with an on-base average of .538 and 20 runs batted in. Camerer, a shortstop, hit .305 with two home runs and 17 RBIs. Johns hit .310.

The other returning letter winners are seniors Ryann Hagen, Kelli Harrington and Alyssa Esplan, juniors Anna Lundberg and Torrie Stencel, and sophomore Rachel Collins. Harrington hit .292 last year with a .440 on-base percentage.

"We are going to be an exciting team to watch," said Hupfeld. "I think we bring vitality to the game that will be difficult to match by any opponent. We are positive towards each other and don't falter when a teammate makes a mistake. Our girls have done a terrific job in remaining a unit and I expect that to continue. This is just a great group of girls to coach and, most importantly, we're just going to have fun with the season and are anxious to get started."

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Hupfeld said the Panthers have a number of active athletes on their squad.

"Most of our players compete in either a fall sport, winter sport or both, so they've definitely been keeping active," he stated. "But in the last couple of months, I've noticed more of our girls being in the weight room in the mornings on a consistent basis as well as a few of our pitchers and catchers which has been evident in the first couple weeks of practice.'

So far, according to Hupfeld, the Panthers have displayed athleticism and teamwork in practice.

"It's coming together slowly, but that has provided me with a lot of confidence heading into the season," he said. "We are lucky enough to have several very talented athletes who, depending on the streak they are on, may find themselves moving up in the lineup. It's a good problem to have. Our girls can rely on their teammates if they are in a slump."

Hupfeld has also seen good hitting and base running skills. About the only weakness he sees is finding a way to replace Schultz on the mound.

"From the plate, we have a few very talented hitters who make consistent contact," said Hupfeld. "We've also shown great speed around the base paths which we will be able to use to our advantage. Our defense has shown good promise and we expect those skills to grow in the next couple of months. If any weakness, we lost a great pitcher last year in Jade Shultz. She has since become a very valuable addition to our coaching staff and will provide very sound coaching that will help our young pitchers grow. But we have a couple pitchers who have shown their merit for the varsity level this season, and even our younger pitchers show great promise in the years to come."

The keys to success for the Panthers this spring?

"How we perform from the mound and how we back up our pitcher in the field will determine our level of success," said

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Baseball **Panthers** again look to compete

NEW RICHLAND - For a long time -35 years, to be exact — there was no question who would be coaching the baseball team at New Richland-Hartland or NRHEG High School.

Jeff Reese was always there.

That changed last spring when Reese took the year off for personal reasons. He did the same this year, which means the Panthers begin their third consecutive season with a new head coach.


Pat Churchill, the Panthers' head boys' basketball coach took over the helm last year as the baseball team finished 4-5 in the conference and 4-10 overall, following Reese's 35-year record of 458.258.

Taking over this spring is first-year teacher Drew Paukert, again assisted by Shawn Larson. He's hoping to guide the Panthers back to at least respectability, their last conference championship coming in 2012.

'I look for us to have the opportunity to improve upon our 4-10 record from last year," said Paukert. "We have a great group of returning players off of last year's squad to mix with a number of quality players that will be playing their first year at the varsity level. If we are able to play to our potential, we hope to be extremely competitive in the conference. In order to make a run at the Gopher Conference as well as in the playoffs, we will need to be solid defensively and throw strikes. Last year scoring runs was not a strength of the team, so coming into this season we know we will have to play quality defense and throw strikes too.

The Panthers graduated two key players off last year's squad, centerfielder Dillon Parpart (.341 average) and catcher Noah Krell (.333).

"Defensively, they will be missed as

well," said Paukert. "Noah did a fantastic job at the catcher position.'

The Panthers have six lettermen returning, including all-conference selection Trevor Tracy and honorable mention allconference pick Dakota Thiele.

Tracy was fourth on the team last year with a .306 batting average and, according to Paukert, is a great bat handler and outstanding bunter. He was the team's ace on the mound with a 2-3 record and 30 strikeouts and, when not pitcher, is an outstanding shortstop. Thiele tied for tops on the team last year with a .341 average and bring tremendous speed to the middle of the Panthes' lineup. He plays second base.

Also returning are Matt Jensen (.302 average), Andy Shutrop, Grant Kyllo and Jet Wayne.

Returning to baseball after two years in track is senior Spencer Tollefson.

"Spencer is a tremendous athlete with a tremendous amount of athletic ability," said Paukert. "We expect Spencer to add some much needed depth to our pitching staff this season, as well as give us another athletic outfielder. Offensively, he could also play a key part in our team's success both on the bases and at the plate.'

One of the Panthers' strengths, according to Paukert, should be the infield.

'We have four seniors returning who started at first base, second base, shortstop, and third base last season," he said. "Overall, we have a number of guys on our roster with great speed. Our top three pitchers in our rotation should be solid,

anchored by seniors Trevor Tracy and Matt Jensen. We have only one starting outfielder back from last year's team. We have a number of athletic kids that will be competing for time in the outfield.'


The biggest question mark is offense. "We graduated two of our top hitters from last year's team in Parpart and Noah. Seniors Thiele (.341), Tracy (.306), and Matt (.302) all return to the top part of our lineup from last year's team. We will need other players to help out and step up offensively."

High hopes for NRHEG spring clay target team

NEW RICHLAND — NRHEG High School is not without a returning conference championship for the 2015 spring season.

The NRHEG clay shooting team returns looking stronger than ever, coming off two conference titles and a runner-up finish the last three years.

Last spring was especially good. The Panthers won the Class AAA Conference 1 championship, placed third in the Class AAA state tournament and finished 11th in the Minnesota State High School League state tournament.

There are 54 students signed up for the spring season, which continues a trend of growth since the team first fielded a squad in 2011. Those kids represent NRHEG, Waseca, JWP and Albert Lea, and the squad has two homeschooled students.

The Panther girls did not graduate a golfer from their 2014 crew, leaving fifthyear head coach Brad Root downright optimistic about challenging in the Gopher Conference and improving on last year's 11-2 overall record and third-place finish in the conference tournament.

Root said he feels good about the Panthers' team chemistry and work ethic. He expects the squad to have a positive attitude in poor weather, make aggressive shots and be risk takers.

"We want to make a good showing at the conference and sub-section tournaments," said Root. "We hope we have some all-conference honors as well as advancement to the section tournament. The girls need to be mentally tough and focused this year. We are counting on continued improvement in all our girls. Making sure they are prepared for whatever weather conditions exist, as well as dealing with situations on the course, will be a priority As always we want our student athletes to enjoy the sport and have fun while at the same time representing our school well. In order to best enjoy the game, a good grasp of the rules of golf is necessary. We will be working on the rules and golf etiquette so our golfers will be knowledgeable and welcome wherever we travel to play.'

part of NRHEG's first team in 2011. The team is again getting sponsors from area businesses. If anyone would like to support the team in the form of a scholarship, contact Sorum at 507-417-2627.

The Panthers start their season Wednesday, April 8, with shoots every week through the end of the school year.

The Minnesota State High School Clay Target League (MSHSCTL) will host more than 8,600 registered student athletes representing 243 trap shooting and 25 skeet shooting high school teams for the 2015 spring season. Led by the support of their schools and more than 2,400 volunteer coaches, thousands of student athletes will participate in shooting sports weekly April through June at more than 150 shooting ranges throughout Minnesota.

"Last year, 6,100 student athletes participated in the spring league," said Jim Sable, Executive Director of the MSH-SCTL. "With the addition of 83 new teams, the expansion of existing teams, the increased capacity of shooting facilities, and the addition of the new spring skeet league are some of the factors attributing to the continued success as Minnesota's fastest-growing high school sport since 2008.

The clay target league is also the safest sport in high school. Since 2001, the MSHSCTL has no reported injuries or gun-free zone violations at school.

Upon completion of the spring league, all trap shooting teams are invited to participate in individual and team competitions at the 2015 MSHSCTL Trap Shooting Championship at the Alexandria Shooting Park in Alexandria, Minnesota scheduled for June 11-16. "With an expected 20,000 attendees including more than 5,000 student athletes, this tournament will be the largest shooting sport event in the world" Sable said.

The spring league culminates with the State Tournament that includes the Minnesota State High School League as a presenting partner. This State Tournament provides the opportunity for the highest qualifying individual and team achievers from the clay target league to compete for the ultimate recognition as state champions from the Minnesota State High School League. In 2014, the Minnesota State High School League became the first state high school interscholastic athletic association in America to provide support and recognition for trap shooting as a high school sport.

The USA High School Clay Target League is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and operates the Minnesota State High School Clay Target League as the independent provider of shooting sports as an extra curricular co-ed and adapted activity for high schools and students in grades six through 12 who have earned their firearms safety certification. The organization's priorities are safety, fun and marksmanship – in that order.

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
